- Students are encouraged to do projects under the supervision of the faculty
- Seminars, group discussions, interactive sessions are regularly conducted by the departments

- ➤ Computer Science and Electronics Departments are equipped with Stateof- the- art classrooms and laboratories
- Physical infrastructure are limited for outdoor sports. Such events are conducted at the Gauhati University sports fields, hardly 2 kilometres away from the institute
- Indoor sports activities are conducted at the college campus.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- > The faculty and ministerial/ administrative / technical staff are recruited on the basis of the rules and regulations laid down by the UGC and Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam.
- ➤ The administrative staff are imparted in-house basic computer skills.
- ➤ The Department of Computer Science conducts the programmes.
- > Students admission is held according to the directives of the DHE, Assam.
- ➤ Since the economic recession of 2012, Companies prefer pool campus sessions generally held at the premier college of Assam, Cotton college.
- Professional institutes are allowed to conduct personality development programmes and counsel on career opportunities.
- Faculty are sent for Orientation programmes/Refresher courses.
- There are a number of committees comprising of faculty members and headed by a convenor to oversee the execution of different tasks.
- > Guests /contractual lecturers are appointed regularly to supplement vacancies/completion of the syllabus .

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- Faculty and Staff recruitment for all vacant posts of administrative /technical staff and faculty posts are advertised in the leading local newspapers.
- Candidates are selected according to the rules and regulations of UGC and Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The institution does not have a MOU with any industry but the students are taken on industrial visits.

- Campus interviews were conducted by IBM Daksh, Wipro, TCS.
- ➤ Since the economic recession at the beginning of the decade, companies prefer pool campus sessions generally held at the premier college of Assam, Cotton College. Students are notified about the sessions.
- Professional institutes are allowed to conduct personality development programmes and counsel on career opportunities.

- courses of study, combinations offered, fee structure, career oriented/certificate courses.

- BPL students are duly considered
- > Admission is also on first come first serve basis
- During admission, a counselling session is conducted by faculty members regarding the availability of courses, combination of subjects, suitability of the courses.
