6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- > There are different committees headed by faculty members to execute the different tasks
- ➤ The Department of Computer Science conducts training programmes in computer skills regularly for the faculty and staff.
- ➤ The new office recruits were sent to B Barooah College, Guwahati for an orientation programme on office management.
- Students admission is in compliance with the Directives of the DHE, Assam
- Since the economic recession, companies prefer pool campus sessions generally held at the premier college of Assam, Cotton College.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- ➤ Faculty and Staff recruitment for all vacant posts of administerial /technical staff and faculty posts are advertised in the leading local newspapers.
- Candidates are selected according to the rules and regulations of UGC and Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam.

- The institution does not have a MOU with any industry but the students are taken on industrial visits.
 - > Currently pool campus sessions are generally held at the premier college of Assam, Cotton College.
